#### THE SUMMER READING CHALLENGE



## The children had a visit from the Findon Valley library, who talked about this year's Summer Reading Challenge.

This summer, children will be challenged to read books from the library and join a gang of friends who love coming up with fun creations, exploring ideas and telling stories together.

From junk modelling to music, dance to drawing and painting, this year's Challenge aims to fire up children's imaginations and unleash storytelling and creativity through the power of reading.

To register online each child will need their own personal library card.

Any children without their own library card need to join online here or visit a West Sussex library to join first, then they can register to take part in the challenge.

You can register now, but the challenge will not start in libraries until **Saturday 13 July**. **From this date you can start borrowing library books** and work your way through the challenge. You have until **Saturday 14 September** to complete the challenge.

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### Who is Liz Pichon?

As a child, Liz loved comics, playing games, drawing and making things, music, basically all the things she now puts in the Tom Gates books.

She went to Brookfield Primary School in London, then to St Augustine's Secondary school in Kilburn. Liz spent two years at Kingsway Princeton in Kings Cross (which she LOVED!) then finally off to study graphic design at Camberwell School of Art.

One of the first jobs she had after college was working for Jive Records in Willesden. She designed album covers for bands and artists and organised lots of photo sessions. It's sounds fancy - but she worked in a portacabin and it wasn't glamorous at all!

She decided to go freelance and began putting her designs onto lots of different products, like T-shirts, stationery, towels and greeting cards. That was when publishers began to ask her to illustrate other people's books.

One of the first books Liz wrote and illustrated was called My Big Brother Boris, which won *The Smarties Silver prize* in 2004. It was THRILLING! It gave her the confidence to keep writing and illustrating.

Liz wrote the first **TOM GATES** book in a school exercise book and her agent Caroline sent copies around to different publishers. They got seven offers in two weeks to publish it. The first Tom Gates book was published in 2011 and won the Roald Dahl Funny Prize, The Red House Book Award Best Book for Young Readers and the Waterstone's Best Fiction for 5-12 year olds Prize.





The fourth book in the series TOM GATES: GENIUS IDEAS MOSTLY won the **Blue Peter Award for Best Story**. In 2013, she was a World Book Day author with TOM GATES: BEST BOOK DAY EVER (SO FAR). The series has been translated into 46 languages and sold over 16.5 million copies world wide. The Brilliant World Of Tom Gates is a TV series, which she co-writes with Ben Ward (from Horrible Histories) and the songs for the show with her husband Mark. He also wrote the theme tune for the TV series as well.

Her book Shoe Wars was her first stand alone novel. She was a proud owner of a Guinness World Record for 'LARGEST DISCO DANCE' along with Horsenden Primary School in 2017. Liz is married with three children and lives in Brighton.


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#### NEW RELEASES.....





He embarks on a journey that takes him across the Channel into France, learning a profound lesson along the way about service and the surprising power of memory.




What should a puppet master do when he's old and alone, and all his puppets are gone? Sylvester makes one last puppet.


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## TEACHER PICKS !

As an avid reader, I find it very difficult to recommend single books. However, one of my reading passions is reading classic stories told with a twist: from other character's points views, with different outcomes, modern retellings or what happened next. To fully appreciate these books, it is better to have read the originals. Books that I have recently enjoyed in this vein have been Dodger by Terry Pratchett, and Another Twisted Tale by Catherine Bruton based on Charles Dickens' Oliver Twist. Reading the classics and then these books that are inspired by them are an excellent way for children to understand the power of a shared understanding and knowledge and the intertextuality between books. I find it really exciting when I suddenly consider a story or a character, I feel I know well is looked at in a different way. (With my teacher hat on, it has incredible impact on children's writing. There are also the Twist in the Tale books, which are based on Disney films such as Aladdin and Beauty and the Beast: these twist the premise of the films in the same way).






Whilst the books mentioned above are aimed at older children, there are many KS1 books that also twist classic stories such as The Three Little Pigs: The True Story of The Three Little Pigs by John Scieszka and A Wolf's Tale by Eva Montanari and Nice Work, Little Wolf which are all fun versions of this classic tale.

Go out and read a classic and then find the alternative tales to revel in and enjoy.

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## What are YOU reading?


#### The Beast of Buckingham Palace Written by David Walliams, illustrated by Tony Ross



The Twelfth Day of July is a novel by Joan Lingard. It is set during the times of the 'Troubles' in Belfast, Northern Ireland. It tells the story of the conflict from the point of view of the teenagers from opposite sides of the street. Kevin, a Catholic and Sadie, a Protestant, are both involved in an escalating war of graffiti, house break-ins, fires and violence. The story is told from each side's point of view of the week before the protestant celebration of the Twelfth of July.

It was a short, gripping read that tells you a lot about recent history. I would recommend this to anyone who likes a little bit of history and action. I would give it a 1/5.

#### Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone by JK Rowlind
